Hugh Thomas

My wife's brother was in 11th grade, yet still reading at a third grade level. He felt motivated to complete the mental training program. At the end of just eight months, he was reading at a college level. He went on to graduate from college, earned a commercial pilot's license and is currently at the top of his nursing class.

Justin Wheelock

A 12-year-old 6th grader, after 4 years in special education, still couldn't write his name on a piece of paper. The school had done their best, but there still was no progress. They recommended Ritalin. We tested him and found him to be highly dyslexic. Twelve weeks after starting therapy, he earned a 90% on a 20-word spelling test. Sixteen weeks later he was reading simple books. Seven months later, at the beginning of the next school year, the school tested him and said he didn't need special education any longer!

Matthew Payne

A 7-year-old 2nd grader struggled with reading. He barely knew his alphabet. The school tested his reading ability and placed it at a preprimer level. They told his parents that he would be lucky to be reading at a 2nd grade level by the time he finished 4th grade. His parents had him tested by our staff and discovered his lack of right-left brain coordination. They enrolled him in our program. Eleven weeks later the school retested him and placed him at the 1.89 grade reading level, a dramatic change. Sixteen weeks later, he was the 2nd best reader in his class.

Jamie Dugas

The above 2nd grader had a classmate who was born with a congenital heart defect. After her 3rd open-heart surgery, she experienced a stroke that left her struggling to walk. Her parents spent much on therapy with mixed results. At the age of seven, she struggled with walking smoothly, and she didn't know her alphabet. Her parents, seeing the results of her classmate above, enrolled her in the program. Within weeks, her walking smoothed out and learning became easier. She learned her alphabet and how to read. She's doing great academically and her parents couldn't be prouder. Three years later she's studying Latin and has no sign of her stroke.

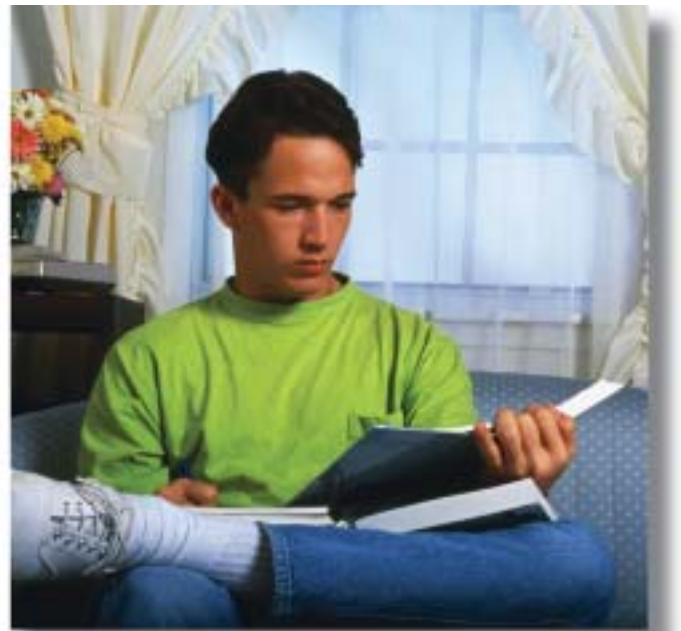
Rudy Garcia

A 42-year-old man with A.D.D. had no trouble getting good paying jobs; it was holding on to them that was the problem. His aspirations to go into the legal field were being effected by his lack of attention to detail, ability to

focus and persistence. He and his brother enrolled in our program. By the end of the year, both were dramatically improved and he was working for a local law firm. He stated that he would have gladly paid \$50,000 for the program 25 years earlier (when he would have been around 15 years old), because he lost twice that in lost earnings.

As a 39-year-old, I did parts of the program along with my children. I noticed a substantially increased ability to focus and to think quickly by the end. In fact, it sometimes seemed like things were moving in slow motion around me. I had a better relationship with my kids due to the bonding time we spent together. An important thing for me was reduced anger and frustration, not only at my kids, but in general. Home was a more peaceful place. Other benefits received include greater persistence and ability to complete projects, and even my athletic skills improved substantially.



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
